Cristobal Morales (1500-1553) is often compared to Giovanni Pierluigi de Palestrina, and although the comparison is always intended to flatter the great Spanish master, it has done his music a disservice, for it has often distorted our perception of it. Despite his long service in Rome, Morales is far closer to the northern spirit of the Netherlanders of the generation of Nicholas Gombert, and if very often his music strikes us as "pre-Palestrina," it is because of Palestrina's admiration for that same generation of Netherlands composers which, in a sense, includes Morales as well, and which gratly affected Palestrina's own style.

In any casee, to look in Morales for the almost placid sound of the later Romans, either as a listener or as a performer, is to miss the most essential aspect of his style: the enormous

rhythmic density, and the drive of the music, which hark back, beyond Gombert, to the style of Josquin Despres. To be sure, Morales' concern for harmonic euphony, a tendency already to be found in the music of Gombert, simply does not allow him to write some of the very harsh dissonances that can be found in Josquin and in Obrecht, and which are part and parcel of the rhythmic language that they were creating. As a consequence, Morales' style presents a less dramatic surface than that of Josquin. It remains, nevertheless, enormously exciting.

Morales wrote virtually no secular music, but within his large corpus of sacred works we find practically every single style being cultivated in his day. The Mass in this record was published in his First Book of Masses (1544), which contains also another Mass on the same cantus firmus for four voices instead of five.

In the present work the famous tune appears transposed to F, and it is seldom used in the manner of a cantus firmus (e.g., in the last Kyrie), instead, Morales derived virtually all of his themes from it, so that the work appears like a great cycle of paraphrase variations on L'homme arme.

In surrounding the Mass with chanted Propers, we have sought to preserve as much as possible its liturgical context. The cantus firmus itself suggested the choice of Propers for Saint James the Great. The apostle, whose relics were venerated in Santiago de Compostela, had since the middle ages become the patron saint of the long Spanish crusade against the Moors, so that the great military order of Spain and Portugal was the Orden de Santiago. James "the armed man" had displaced James the pilgrim in the popular imagination of the time.

Following local Spanish usage in the early 16th century, we have sung the Gradual Nimis honorati instead of the Gradual found for the saint's feast in the modern chant books.
